Learning life lessons as a CNA

s Rhonda Billig offers a hand to a patient, she asks, "Do you want to go for a walk?" As a certified nursing assistant (CNA) at Jacobson Memorial Hospital Care Center (JMHCC), she gently holds a wrinkled hand, steadying a walk. Or tips a glass of water to thirsty lips. Or shares a laugh or a joke.

CNAs at JMHCC in Elgin offer dignity and quality of life to those who

During a typical shift, CNAs help long-term patients with their daily care, from dressing in the morning to helping with meals to tucking them back into bed at night.

JMHCC has 27 CNAs on staff; 11 are high school or college students who work as needed.

And JMHCC has implemented inhouse training to make it even easier for students to start a career path. "Providing local training for this certification allows our young people in the community to become involved at our critical access hospital. It can open doors for a career in the health care field. This is a great job opportunity for people of any age that can keep our hospital thriving with local staff members," says Director of Nursing Jessica Werner.

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How to start

Upon applying and being accepted for the position, a CNA then completes an 80-hour class, all while getting paid.

"That's very valuable, especially to the high school and college kids who can do all their training right here, and get paid for doing their training," says Human Resources Coordinator Kristin Heid. Training onsite also allows JMHCC to fill positions more quickly, rather than waiting for other training options.

A CNA must pass a written test and a skills test to obtain certification. The skills test might entail transferring a patient from a bed to a wheelchair, bathing a patient or brushing someone's teeth. CNAs do not administer medications or shots, but may assist a nurse with basic care.

Those who have experience may simply pass the tests and forego the additional training. CNAs must recertify with the state every two years, which is often accomplished by simply working a certain number of hours.

Training covers general anatomy and health conditions, personal care such as bathing, grooming and eating, learning how to take vital signs, transferring a patient, working with a patient with mental health needs such as Alzheimer's and learning residents' rights.

"There are 24 different skills that they learn to pass the CNA education course," says instructor Holly Gaugler, a registered nurse. Trainees are paired with a certified CNA to get real-life, on-the-job practice, too.

"I think it's great, because you give people who are in the community an option to take a class and learn a new trade without having to leave the community," Gaugler says. "But I think the biggest thing is we're giving high school kids a foot in the door in the medical field. ... Knowing these basic CNA skills just gives them a great foundation."

The next class will be June 5-16. A CNA starting wage is \$17, and the position is eligible for a \$4,000 signon bonus. Apply with Kristin Heid at kheid@jmhcc.org or call 584-7247.

Training during the summer helps high school students, says senior Zoey Heid.

"I very much enjoyed the way Holly and Jacobson Memorial set up the CNA training," she says. "I also found it very nice that they were able to get us through the classroom and have our shadow hours all complete before the summer was over, so we were able to work by ourselves for a couple of weeks. It was also nice that we got paid to be in the classroom and to do

shadow hours."

Attracting a high school and college workforce benefits both the students and JMHCC.

"It's a great opportunity for them to get into the medical field and make sure it's something they want to do long-term, but it helps us out greatly when they can come in for that 5 to 9 shift and help do the evening routines," Kristin Heid says. "It works good for them to get a few hours, get a little extra cash and it helps us to fill that shift."

High school workforce

Six Grant County High School students are now working at JMHCC after becoming certified through onsite CNA classes, including Zoey Heid, Ameerah Rosin, Emilie Raab, Bailey Anderson, Delaney Hoffman and Madison Zimmerman.

And the CNA position is a foun-

dation for those planning medical careers.

"I plan to be a physical therapist, and CNA work has been so helpful in giving me a head start on my future career," says Emilie, who is a high school senior.

"I am using this experience as a way to gain additional knowledge in the medical field. It has allowed me to see what areas best fit me and which may not interest me as much. I always knew I wanted to pursue a career in the medical field, but with so many options and directions to go, I was never sure where exactly I would end up. I feel this job has helped me tremendously," Zoey says.

"I am looking at going to nursing school and specializing in pediatrics, and becoming a CNA has just given me a better understanding of how a hospital works," says Delaney, who is a junior. "I decided to become a CNA to become more experienced. I am wanting to become a nurse and being a CNA helps me work with people who need help. I get to see nurses working firsthand with patients and residents," says Bailey, another senior.

"I decided to become a CNA, because it was a great job opportunity and a good first step in looking at the medical field range of jobs. I also love working and helping people, trying to make a difference in people's lives, always trying to bring a smile across their face and lend a helping hand, and this job allows me to do so. Becoming a CNA has given me the skillsets I need to be ready to accomplish my job wherever I am and whenever I need to," says Madison, who is a junior.

"I decided to become a CNA, because I am interested in pursuing

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a career in health care, and this was a good way to get into that. Being a CNA is a very emotionally rewarding job, and I love getting to see how my role is impacting lives," Ameerah says.

All the CNAs have one other commonality – a love for the patients at JMHCC.

"It is a very rewarding job, as I am helping someone's quality of life by giving good care to them and it is a great feeling. I have also learned so many lifeskills from other CNAs," Emilie says.

"I find that being a CNA is so rewarding. I love working with the residents and seeing the smiles on their faces. One of the things I enjoy most is the fact that I know a lot of the residents and they can tell me stories of my grandparents or even my parents. I also love all of the staff at JMHCC. They are all so nice and make it easy for me as a student-athlete to come back after maybe not working for a couple of weeks from my busy schedule," Zoey says.

"The part I like about being a CNA is working with the residents. I love hearing about their life experiences and what life advice they have," Bailey says.

"Sometimes my favorite thing to do is to just go and sit and talk and visit with the residents. Those conversations and talks are the things that stick with me the most and bring smiles across both of our faces," Madison shares.

"I like being a CNA, because it's a very rewarding job. I get to see how my care can put a smile on faces and brighten a day. I love getting to visit with the residents while helping them It's just overall a very gratifying job," Ameerah says.

The high school CNAs also encour-

age others to apply for the job, which offers flexibility to those involved in high school activities, too.

"You gain so much knowledge and go through so many experiences. Being a CNA can set you up for any medical-related job. You learn the basics of patient care; you learn many people skills, patience, respect, time management, work ethic, responsibility and so much more. Even just going through the class to see if you would enjoy it will benefit you," Zoey says. "I would highly recommend this job. Yes, it is very hard work, but what you put into it, you get out. It's very rewarding and allows you to make a difference in so many people's lives, including your own," Madison says.

"I would encourage them to become a CNA, even if they are not looking at going into the medical field. I have learned so many life lessons from becoming a CNA," Delaney says. ■

Chem 14: \$30 (Must fast beforehand) Used to check organ function and monitor certain health conditions.

Complete blood count: \$23

(Must fast beforehand) A complete blood count checks hemoglobin, and white and red blood cells. Used to detect anemia or infections.

FIT test: \$39

This take-home kit, recommended for those ages 50-75, assists in screening for colorectal cancer.

Glycated hemoglobin (A1C): \$27 Used to detect diabetes.

Lipid panel: \$37

(Must fast beforehand) Measures the amount of cholesterol and triglycerides in your blood to monitor heart health.

PSA: \$42 Tests for prostate cancer.

Vitamin B12: \$38 Tests for B12 levels.

Iron: \$23 Tests iron levels for anemia.

Vitamin D: \$53 Tests for Vitamin D deficiency.
